Three of us on the team have been taking an online TESOL certification course, and Susan and Laura have spent a lot of time putting together lesson plans. I feel so blessed to have this opportunity to work with the rest of our amazing trip team to help the HBS students and staff improve their English skills. Not only do they express a desire to be able to better communicate with us when we visit, good English speaking skills will greatly increase their chances of getting a good-paying job when they finish high school.



This year the students at Spring-field Christian School have been learning more about Myanmar and what is happening at MyHope. My friends and I have been trying to find ways to help provide things to the kids in Myanmar that we take for granted here.



What we wanted at first was to make about one hundred dollars. We expected that would be enough to pay for the VBS snacks for the kids at MyHope when our friends go visit. Boy, were we wrong! Our customers were very generous and our final amount was ten times that! \$1,011!! We were very, very surprised! We had a lot of help from friends and family.

When I found out what our total amount was, I felt happy, glad, thankful and amazed. The Lord sure did provide. I am excited about how this money can provide for the kids in Myanmar. We just want them to know they are loved and thought about. And we want them to be able to experience some of the good things we get to experience.

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IDES Comes Through Again!

We are so thankful for IDES (International Disaster Emergency Services)! They have helped the people of Myanmar in so many ways over the years with grants for a variety of natural disasters, from cyclones and earthquakes to rat plagues and forest fires. Now they have helped us again.

One of our major projects this year is helping the Christians in northwest Myanmar to rebuild and repair their broken -down old church buildings, or to build completely new buildings. The congregations are doing what they can to gather materials, and prepare the properties for the rebuilding effort.

One of those congregations had just spent a lot of time, money, and effort gathering logs in the forest and sawing them into lumber. They were going to use this wood as part of their church rebuilding effort. Unfortunately, one day a few weeks ago a fire broke out in the forest and burned up all of their work!

The Christians were very discouraged. They had invested all of what little money they had collected to purchase the logs and pay for the "saw men" to come and cut the wood. They had also invested a lot of time and effort providing the labor to haul the logs and do most of the heavy work involved. They thought that all of their work and investment had been in vain, and now they did not know how they would be able to rebuild their church, even with the help of Myanmar Hope.

Another small congregation in the area, one of the poorest, had lost their church building to the military government several years ago. The military leaders had forced them to tear down and destroy their little building, and they have never been able to fully recover from that disaster.

Since then they have been able to lay a brick foundation for a new building, and collect some lumber in preparation, but they have been saving since 2003 and they are not even close to having enough money to rebuild their church.

Last month Palal informed us of the situation and how discouraged the Christians were. We put together a grant request to IDES, asking for their help with the fire disaster and also for the disaster resulting from the military oppression. We were delighted to receive a grant from them to help both of these congregations!

The grant is enough to help them both recover some of what was lost, but not all. It is up to us to help them the rest of the way. We still need several thousand dollars to help both of these congregations completely finish their church buildings.
