Hope Boarding School

The new school year (2015-2016) started at the end of May, and so the children are now settled into their daily routines.

There are twenty-one new students this year! **Praise God that all of them are now sponsored.** Everyone at MyHope and HBS are so happy and thankful for those of you who give sacrificially so that these children can have hope for a better future.

All of the children at Hope Boarding School come from extreme poverty. Most of their families are subsistence farmers. Some of the children are orphans and some are the children of single mothers either because the father has died, or has abandoned the family, or is in prison.

For most of these children there were times during the year when they did not have anything to eat. They and their families were reduced to scavenging for food in the hills and forests. None of them had

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adequate medical care or access to a good education. *And none had any hope for a different or a better future.*

For **these children**, at least, all of that has changed! Thanks to the love gifts of their sponsors, they are now well fed, well cared for, and all of them have the opportunity for a decent education.

Will you please pray for these children and their sponsors who are giving sacrificially to love and help these children survive, thrive, and find a better life?

Update on Ma Mang

Many of you are aware of the situation with our HBS student Mr. Thang Len Mang (Ma Mang). He has been valiantly battling leukemia for nearly five years.

Ma Mang has been receiving monthly chemotherapy treatments, as well as regular spinal taps (which are very painful) this whole time. Yet through all of this he has maintained a very positive attitude, and he always has a big smile on his face whenever we see him.

Last summer it appeared that Ma Mang had finally beaten the cancer. He seemed to be in remission, and we were ready to pronounce him healed.

Then in November of last year the disease came back with a vengeance. He was readmitted to the hospital cancer ward, where he had already spent so much time. The doctors said that Ma Mang had lived longer than anyone else who had been on that ward.

Last December several of us had the honor and privilege of visiting Ma Mang and his father (who was caring for him) in the hospital for the first time. It was heart breaking to see him lying there, in obvious pain, as we gave him his Christmas presents. He tried to smile, but we could see he was not doing well at all, so we did not stay long, but we did lay hands on him and pray for him before we left.

Then, last May, it appeared again that Ma Mang was well enough to return home to HBS. His father and grandmother, who were caring for his needs at the hospital, returned home to their village. We were all praising God for Ma Mang.

A Turn for the Worse

Imagine our surprise and shock when we received a message from Palal on June 29th telling us that when Ma Mang woke that morning he could not stand or walk on his own, and was experiencing tremendous pain. They rushed him back to the hospital, where he was readmitted to the cancer ward. His blood pressure was 80 over 40, and he had to be put on a breathing tube. His skin began to break out into large sores all over his body. He had tremendous burning pain in his side and had lost control of his bowels.

The oncologists said he was much worse, and there was nothing more they could do for him. It appeared that the cancer was finally going to win after all. He only had a few days left to live, apparently.

His father, his mother, and his grandmother returned to Yangon. His mother was extremely distraught, for this was the first time she had been able to see Ma Mang in over five years.

His parents and grandmother wanted to take Ma Mang back to their village, to visit one last time with all the relatives, and then to die there. However, the village is over five hundred miles from Yangon, and the trip takes at least two days. We would have to rent an ambulance for Ma Mang, and Palal would follow in his car with Ma Mang's family.

Through all of these discussions Ma Mang was very adamant that he did not want to return to the village. His father tried to convince him, but was unwilling to force the issue. We began to make arrangements for either transportation to the village, or burial in Yangon.

All of his friends at HBS, who were more like brothers and sisters now, were devastated by the news. Palal put together a video slide show with pictures of Ma Mang. When he showed it to the other children at HBS, they wept many tears. Palal said, "Their tears even got the floor wet during watching the movie and praying."

We posted updates every day on Facebook, and thousands of people around the country and the world were praying for Ma Mang. It was very touching to see the number of people who had committed to pray for Ma Mang, his family, and the doctors.

On July 5th, the doctors removed his breathing tube and catheter. His father had to carry Ma Mang to and from the latrine so he could relieve himself. It seemed just a matter of time, yet somehow Ma Mang kept holding on. And he continued to refuse to be taken back to his village.

On July 7th, Ma Mang was still covered in sores and experiencing a lot of pain, but he was breathing fine on his own. He received two units of blood, and that seemed to help him feel better.

The Miracle

On the morning of July 8th, we received this message from Palal:

"Kikim and I just left from the hospital. Ma Mang's condition is very improved. He can sit by himself. He feels no pain on his side. Praise God! Over 20 round sore spots on his skin (legs, arms, back) are healed!!"

He also attached a copy of the oncology report, which said, "Cytological exam of CSF (cerebral spinal fluid) shows occasional lymphocytes (white blood cells). Malignant cells are not seen." The remark stated, "Negative cytology for malignancy, CSF."

Everyone, especially Ma Mang's parents and grandmother, were overjoyed! This photo says it all:

Needless to say, there was much rejoicing at this news! We can only attribute this recovery to God. One day Ma Mang was on his death bed, and they were preparing for his funeral. The next day, he was sitting up, smiling, and completely free of cancer cells! Is it a miracle? We think so. We believe that God heard and answered the prayers of his people everywhere.

We have said many times that we believe God has great things in store for Ma Mang. He is such a fighter, he has such a sweet spirit, and he loves Jesus with all his heart. Thank you all for praying for him, and thank you to all who have contributed funds to pay for his medical treatment.

There is only one appropriate word with which to finish this story (for now): **Hallelujah!**

Soy Milk for HBS



Many thanks to a very generous couple who donated enough funds to purchase soy milk for all of our kids at HBS for the entire school year! Now, twice a week, each student will receive a 300 ml serving of soy milk.

Soy milk is a great addition to the diet provided to our kids. It is high in protein, easily digestible, and

packed with essential nutrients. Dairy milk is not widely available in Myanmar, and most of the children are lactose intolerant. Soy milk is a delicious treat for them, and it is so healthy.

Hope Boarding School Current Needs List

Some of you may be wondering how you can help the students and staff at Hope Boarding School. We have a lot of items on that list! Here are a few:

One Commercial Washer	1,500.00

One Water Tank	
Tile and Paint the Stairwells	4,000.00
Two Electric Meters (each)	300.00

The dryer is an especially great need right now!

Normally the children hang their clothes out to dry on poles, but during the rainy season this is not possible. So they hang their clothes inside, wherever they can find space. With all of the mois-

ture in the air, sometimes it take three or four days for their clothes to dry.

Will you please consider a donation today to help us purchase a commercial dryer for use by our HBS students and staff? Thank you!

Update: Since we started writing this newsletter, all of the funds needed to purchase the dryer have been supplied by many of you! Praise God for His provision and thank you all for being so generous!

Now the students need a **washing machine** to go with the dryer. Having a washing machine will free up a lot of time for the students, as they will not need to wash their clothes by hand. Please consider donating any amount to help purchase a new Whirlpool commercial washer, which costs about \$1,500 (including delivery).

Another very pressing need is an **additional water tank** for the new building. One tank is barely supplying the water needs of 25 girls, Palal's family, and two adult staff members.

A new tank will cost \$1,500 to purchase, deliver, and install (including additional plumbing). Please consider giving a gift of any size today to help with this need. Thank you!

HBS Building Update

Earlier this year, MyHope received a \$1,000 donation marked to be used for HBS. Palal asked if they could use the funds to expand the tiny kitchen area so that the cook would have more room to prepare food for everyone.

The board was completely in agreement with this request. The little cooking area was only about the size of a small American bathroom, and really was inadequate for the number of people now at HBS.

In order to expand across the back of the old building they needed to remove an old water tank that was situated above the bathrooms, attached to the wall just outside the second floor windows. It was old and no longer used, but it still collected rainwater, and it was leaky and unstable.

As the contractors were in the process of removing the old tank, a large section of the back wall collapsed.

Thankfully, no one was hurt!

The building is very old, and while it is structurally sound, the process of removing that tank weakened the back

wall enough that the old concrete just gave way.

Now the \$1,000 donation was not going to be enough to finish the job. The back wall had to be rebuilt, and the windows and a door would also need to be replaced.

An emergency request was sent to I.D.E.S., and they very graciously responded with a grant of \$2,500. Now there was enough to at least get the walls, floor, door, and windows completed. THANK YOU I.D.E.S. for coming to the rescue again!

Palal still needs funds to complete the cabinets for storage, so if anyone would like to donate for that, it would be much appreciated!

More Help from I.D.E.S.

I.D.E.S. has helped us with several projects already this year. Here are a couple more.

New House for a Poor Widow

Earlier this year, Palal made us aware of the desperate situation of Mrs. Nem Kho Lam, a member of Valpabung Christian Church.

She and her husband had one child, Mr. Hem Gou Len. Her husband died in November of 2014. As a widow she cannot make enough money to support her son, and many times they were very hungry.

Then, on April 23rd her little hut was destroyed when a big tree fell on it dur-

ing a storm. Neither she nor her son were hurt, but their old hut was a total loss.

The church members and neighbors, (who are all very poor themselves) pitched in and tried to rebuild her house, but they could only finish the frame. They did not have enough money to pay for a roof, floor, or walls.

We again reached out to I.D.E.S. for help, and they graciously granted \$1,000 to finish the house.

Mrs. Nem Kho Lam and her son are staying with Pastor Lun Kho Thang while her new house is being finished. We also added her to our Family Support Program, so now she will at least be assured enough food each month.

Thank you to the generous people who donate funds each month so that poor widows, orphans, and the disabled can be fed and cared for.

New Well for Hope Preschool

Another generous grant was given by I.D.E.S. earlier in the year for a new well, but the construction was delayed because of weather and other causes. The well has now been completed and is being used every day!

The old well ran nearly dry last fall, and when we held our annual convention there was not enough water to supply all the needs. We realized a new well was needed, as this well was also used for Tamu Preschool. Many of the neighbors also rely on water from this well.

Six acres have been cleared, plowed, cultivated, and planted. That includes

five acres of sugar cane and one acre of rice.

The new crop is growing well, even after a short period of drought when they really needed some rain.

Dozens of local people were hired to help clear and prepare the land, and then to help plant the crops.

The family of Mr. Ngam Kho Len has been hired to live on the farm as caretakers. Ngam Len is a former HBS student. He decided to return home from HBS at the end of last school year. He was twenty-one years old and still not finished with high school. He felt it was time to go back home and help on the farm. He was a very hard worker and a good example for the younger boys at HBS, and we know he will be a great help to his mother and father.

When harvested, the first crop will be used as seed for next year and for expanding the farm into as many more acres as MyHope can afford to clear. Clearing the land is the most expensive part, as it is the most labor intensive. Please consider helping to fund this wonderful project that will impact so many lives in the future.

Church Rebuilding

Last fall, Myanmar Hope held a fundraising dinner to raise money for the construction of at least two new church buildings for our brothers and sisters in Northwest Myanmar.
