Tenth Anniversary Ministry Celebration Dinner

What an incredible evening! There are really no words to describe such a fantastic event, but we will try.

Planning for the event began months ago. MaryAnn Cherry put in countless hours making phone calls, scheduling appointments, and coordinating volunteers. As the time grew closer, more volunteers

Many thanks go out to the volunteers who helped make the evening such a great success. Anne Tetzlaff coordinated the distribution of tickets. Caren Hughs, with the help of others, recruited table sponsors to cover the cost of the event. Laura Crater arranged the evening's program. Missy Farley and Susan Cormeny were responsible for the table decorations, which turned out beautifully. Several friends helped check in the guests and direct them to their tables. Billie Jarvis-Freeman did an excellent job as our MC. Troy Freeman created a live painting during the event, which was auctioned off at the end of the evening. Kevin Hughs, one of our board members, did a great job as auctioneer.

The venue was beautifully arranged and the staff of the Crowne Plaza did a wonderful job of making sure every need was taken care of.

But thanks go out most of all to the over four-hundred and fifty people who came out to show their love and support to the Khongsai family and Myanmar Hope Christian Mission!

After a delicious meal served by the Crowne Plaza staff, the program began with a professional video, created by Gabe Rutledge, highlighting the work of MyHope. It featured several people who have traveled with us to Myanmar to see and experience the work firsthand.

Next up was a testimony by Miss Haley Atwater, a young lady who took part in the special Move4Myanmar/Kid2Kid (M4M/K2K) program last fall. M4M was originally the brain child of Cynthia Ward to encourage kids and adults to do things that they enjoy doing to help raise funds

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for Myanmar Hope Christian Mission.

Last fall Laura Crater put together the K2K program specifically for the students of Springfield Christian School (but open to anyone) as a way to raise funds to help cover the transportation costs associated with bringing the Khongsai family to America. Each participant was to choose a movement and then request sponsors to help them raise at least \$100.00 each.

Over one hundred children and teachers participated, and together they raised well over the amount needed to cover all of the transportation costs!

Miss Haley Atwater chose bike riding as her favorite movement, and she blew past the one hundred dollar mark. She raised over one thousand dollars! Because of her extraordinary efforts, she was asked to give a short testimony at the dinner about why she participated and what she accomplished. After her talk she was honored as Billie prayed a prayer of blessing over her and presented her with a traditional Kuki blanket from Palal and Kikim.

Next was a special presentation to honor and thank Dr. Rob Burris DDS for the countless hours he has spent doing pro-bono dental work on Palal, Kikim, Solomon, and Cherry.

Khongsai Family Update

As most of you know, the whole Khongsai family came to the USA in late February for an extended visit. It was a very busy, fruitful, time for both the family and the ministry of MyHope.

They arrived in Seattle on March first and spent a week with Chuck and Mary Ann Cherry, getting over the jetlag and preparing for two months of virtually non-stop travel and meetings.

On March 9th, the Khongsais and MaryAnn Cherry flew to Springfield, Illinois. The Khongsais stayed with Luke, Laura, Jacob, and Adelyn Crater,

while MaryAnn stayed with Troy, Billie, and Ginnie Freeman. We are so thankful for the Craters and the Freemans who were generous and gracious hosts.

The Springfield visit was a very busy time. On the first Sunday morning, Palal, Kikim, Solomon and Cherry all spoke to two joint Adult Bible Fellowship classes at West Side Christian Church.

On the second Sunday, the Khongsais visited Christian Church of Witt. Palal gave a presentation to the adults while MaryAnn interviewed Solomon and Cherry during the children's Sunday School hour. Palal preached a sermon to the entire congregation during their regular service hour.

The third Sunday in Springfield was spent at Lakeside Christian Church. The family was introduced to the congregation at the beginning of each service. Palal shared a ministry update with adults during the first two service times, and the entire family spoke and sang for the children during the last service hour. After church some of us enjoyed a delicious meal prepared by Lola Garrison.

On the final Sunday in Illinois, we attended the Truthseekers ABF at WSCC. This is the adult class the Cherrys and Khongsais were a part of when we lived together in Springfield. Then we attended the fourth hour service time. Although the Cherrys and Khongsais are no longer in Springfield, we love and miss our Westside family, so it was good to be back to worship together.

During the month of March, the Khongsais also visited each one of the Springfield Christian School classrooms. Palal spoke to the entire staff and student body during Wednesday Chapel, and the family sang together to the delight of all. Although Palal has visited SCS in the past, it was fun for the students to have a chance to meet the entire family. It was also a privilege for the Khongsais to meet and thank the teachers and students who have so faithfully prayed for and supported MyHope and Hope Boarding School!

Another important event during the Illinois visit was a meeting with the Board of Directors of Christian Horizons

(formerly known as Christian Homes). Please see the article later in this edition for more details about this exciting and important new partnership.

From Tennessee it was back to the St. Louis area for a few days, and Palal got a chance to meet with friends he had made during his 2014 trip to Israel with folks from Harvester Christian Church.

After their time in Missouri, Palal and family headed out to Tulsa, Oklahoma to spend time with friends and relatives who have immigrated to America. After that, it was back to the home of Chuck and MaryAnn Cherry for a week of sight-seeing and preparations for the return trip to Yangon.

Within a week or so of being back, though, Kikim was struck with Dengue Fever and had to be hospitalized for several days. She is slowly recovering, but she is still very tired.

One reason she is still tired, we think, is related to another piece of news that we recently received from Palal: Kikim is expecting another baby! The doctor set the due date in early January of 2018, but that is all we know at this point. Stay tuned for more information!

HBS Update

Two of our 10th grade girls passed their final exam! We are so proud of Lhing Kho Nei of Bokkan Village, and Neng Khan Chin of Valpabung Village.

Only 36% of all students in the whole country who sat for the exam were able to pass. As you know from our previous newsletters, only about 25% of all students even make it all the way to high school. So passing the exam is really a tremendous feat, and especially so for rural children whose mother tongue is not Burmese (the exam is given in Burmese and English). Our students, of course, speak the Kuki-Chin language.

We praise God for these two young

ladies, both of whom have been at HBS since nearly the beginning. Lhing Nei was one of our first students. She arrived in Yangon in March of 2010. Khan Chin came the next year in 2011. We also praise God for their sponsors, who made it possible for them to live at HBS and get an education.

Lhing Nei and Khan Chin want to go home to their villages for awhile to spend time with their family. They are both eligible to attend university, so they might do that next year.

Sustainable Agriculture Project Update

We are all very excited about the new additions to the farm that your generous donations have made possible.

First, earlier this year, we were able to purchase a sugarcane press. This is a motorized mill that squeezes all of the

juice out of the cane. The juice can then be sold as is, or boiled down into a very thick syrup. When the syrup hardens, it is cut into squares and sold in the market as candy.

This allows the farm workers to use all of the available sugar cane, even the stalks that are too small to sell individually.

Thanks to the incredibly generous friends who attended our tenth anniversary dinner, Palal was able to purchase a brand new tractor with implements, and a new/used light truck for use at the farm and at the preschool.

The timing on the tractor purchase was absolutely perfect (in other words, God had a hand in it, of course). The Myanmar Department of Agriculture had been working with the New Holland tractor company to make available brand new tractors at a reduced cost for farmers in rural Myanmar. That's us! The tractors became available in Mandalay just as Palal and family were getting home from their visit in America.

Our friends at the dinner donated \$20,000 for the purchase of a tractor, and \$20,000 for the purchase of a truck. Palal spent a lot of time researching the truck purchase, going to many different dealers. He finally settled on a used Toyota truck from a dealer in Yangon.

The tractor, the truck, and equipment for both came to \$41,006.00, which was \$1,006.00 over our budget. However, the generous friends at our dinner actually gave more than we requested, so there was enough funds to cover the difference!

Here is the cost breakdown:

This new tractor with its implements will allow us to greatly expand our farm, and will allow us to do the work that needs to be done on our own schedule. In the past we had to rent a tractor from the government and pay for an operator and, since there are only a few tractors available, we would have to wait our turn. The government-run farms would always get the first shot at the tractors.

Now we do not have to wait for a tractor to become available, because we have our own! Praise God!

The New Holland tractors are made in India, so parts and accessories will be easy to source. The fact that they do not need to be imported from overseas

helps keep the costs down as well.

Valpabung South was one of the projects highlighted at the ten year anniversary dinner in March. It was a great pleasure to be able to inform the congregation that enough funds were donated by the generous believers in America so that construction could begin right away. Now the carpenters and members of the congregation are working hard to get the new building up before the monsoons begin in earnest.

Disaster Relief

In March of this year a fire started in the remote mountain village of Sipeh. It started while most of the adults were out clearing land for their next crop of rice.

The children who are not old enough to work in the fields stay back and prepare dinner for their parents so that it will be ready for them when they arrive home. One of the cooking fires got out of control and, as a result, seven homes were completely burned to the ground.

The villagers are very poor, and they had no resources of their own with which to rebuild. They really needed new homes built before the rainy season started in late May/early June. The people of Sipeh Village contacted Palal and requested his help.

We sent a request to I.D.E.S. (International Disaster Emergency Services) asking for a grant with which to rebuild some basic homes for the seven families. I.D.E.S. granted our request, and soon the rebuilding started.

The village is so remote and difficult to reach, though, that getting supplies to them was a real challenge. Some of the supplies, such as corrugated steel and nails, had to be left at the bottom of the mountain and carried up by hand by the villagers. Other supplies, such as lumber, were able to be sourced from the surrounding forest. The carpenters cut down trees and sawed the logs into pillars and boards using their chainsaws and other hand tools.

Now the houses are all nearly finished, and the families are so grateful! We are also very thankful for the grant from

I.D.E.S., and for the many churches and individuals who make sacrificial donations to I.D.E.S. so that they can respond quickly when disasters strike.

New Pathway Home

MyHope is partnering with Christian Horizons (formerly Christian Homes) on an exciting new project called the New Pathway Home. This project will help elderly men and women who no longer have family members who can adequately care for them.

Christian Horizons is a national leader in senior healthcare and living. They were founded in Lincoln, Illinois in 1962. Inspired by one man's dream of creating a place where his loved ones could age with dignity in a Christian atmosphere, he and men from nearby churches raised funds to purchase property in Lincoln, where they built and opened the first Christian Nursing Home, with 48 beds, in 1965.



Christian leaders from other areas soon expressed interest in Christian Nursing Homes. This prompted a long period of expansion—adding memory care, short-term rehabilitation, skilled care and hospice care, as well as senior independent and assisted living options in many of our communities.

Today, over fifty years later, they have changed their name to Christian Horizons, and they have become one of the nation's largest, faith-based, not-for-profit senior living providers—with thirteen communities across four states, all deeply committed to the well-being of their residents and their families.

Last September, Tim Phillippe, CEO of Christian Horizons, and his wife Mary Fern, one of our board members, visited northwest Myanmar with Palal and Mary Ann Cherry. While there they witnessed first hand the extreme poverty, the great needs, and many hardships of families with elderly members. Together they discussed the situation and how they might work together to begin helping these families.

When he lived in the USA for three years while studying for his doctorate, Palal spoke at several different Christian Homes campuses. He saw the wonderful ways in which families in America are able to care for their elderly parents and grandparents. This also made him sad because he knew that no such thing existed for his people in northwest Myanmar.

When they returned to America after their trip, Tim and Mary Fern shared their experiences with the Christian Horizons Board of Directors. As the conversation continued with Palal, it was decided that he should come to St Louis to present his ideas directly to the board. This meeting took place in early March, after Palal and his family arrived in Springfield, Illinois.

The meeting with the Board of Directors went well, and they agreed to form a partnership with MyHope to fund the building and staffing of our very first home for the elderly in northwest Myanmar!

Palal has been working with the local authorities to get all of the necessary permits in order; now construction has finally begun. The groundbreaking dedication occurred on June 24, 2017.

The new home will provide housing and care for six elderly widows and two full-time caregivers. The first residents have already been chosen, and are waiting expectantly for the time when they can move in. The new residents will be:

1. Pi Dei Neng of Tamu
2. Pi Ngahpi of Tuidimjang
3. Pi Lam Kho Tin of Khomunnom
4. Pi Nu Vom of Tingkaya
5. Pi Tin Kho Hoi of Jangngouphai
6. Pi Nem Za Hat of Vokso

The new home will provide food, clothing, shelter, and medical care for the residents. Palal has been in contact with local doctors and nurses who have agreed to help us with any medical problems that might arise.

We are all so excited for this new project to get underway! If this project moves your heart, or if you think that your church, Sunday school class, or small group would like to help support this, please get in contact with us. It will cost about \$1,000.00 per month to care for the residents and maintain the new home. Would you or your group consider sponsoring part of that cost?
